About the Choreographer

Louisiana native and Colorado transplant Helanius J. Wilkins is an associate professor of dance and the associate chair and director of dance at CU Boulder. He is a choreographer, performance artist, educator, certified Colorado Change Leader and activist (artist-activist), whose career spans 29 years of creating choreographies that bridge dance and social justice. Having choreographed more than 60 works, foundations/organizations including NEA, NEFA National

Dance Project, and National Performance Network have supported his work. He founded and artistically directed D.C.-based EDGEWORKS Dance Theater, an all-male dance company predominantly of Black men that toured nationally and internationally (2001-2014). His primary focus is a multi-year, multi-outcome art and social change work titled *The Conversation Series: Stitching the Geopolitical Quilt to Re-Body Belonging*. Service is integral to his work; therefore, he has, and continues to, serve on boards for varied organizations and often volunteers for projects.

About the Choreographer

Laura Malpass is a teaching artist, dancer and choreographer—a lover of laughter, learning, listening, chosen and blood family, good books, baking, writing, whimsy, crisp autumn mornings and all things succulent. She believes in change, joy, curiosity, parables and metaphor, and softening into the way life circles and folds in on itself.

Malpass is a lecturer at CU Boulder and assistant school director at Boulder Ballet School. Her choreographic process invites the body's rich physical memory of its emotional, relational, and experiential lives to the surface; their dance film shorts have been featured at Sans Souci Festival of Dance Cinema, ACDA, and CODEO. Malpass is an ABT® Certified Teacher in Primary through Level 7 of the ABT® National Training Curriculum and was named a Teaching Fellow in 2015. Malpass' research in embodied pedagogy practices is continually transforming and expanding: they explore how somatics can be used as a feminist pedagogical tool to restructure classroom power dynamics; cultivating the holistic dancer through a biopsychosocial lens of health, connection, and education; applications of the Ungrading Movement as a practice of equity; and inviting students to partner in co-creating learning spaces with curiosity, compassion and care. lauramalpass.com

About the Choreographer

Larry Southall holds an MFA in performance and choreography from the University of Colorado Boulder. A native of the Bronx, New York, he began working with hip-hop dance forms in the early 1980's. He has worked with the Boulder Ballet, The Harambee African Dance Ensemble, Blue Moon Dance Company, Motion Underground, Longmont Symphony and Dance Theatre, Cleo Parker Robinson Summer Institute, Denvr School of the Arts and Steamboat Springs Dance Theatre. He has served as a master teacher at Dance Place in Washington, D.C., at Slippery Rock University, and for the American College Dance Festival. Southall has choreographed for the Native Tongue Dance

Theatre, Skeleton Dance Project, The Black College Dance Exchange and the Legacies concert of the American College Dance Festival in Boulder, and is respected nationally as one of the great traditional Hip-hop teachers. Southall is currently artistic director of The Grass Roots Project under the direction of Rennie Harris.

Erika Randall is a dance professor and interim dean and vice provost for undergraduate education at CU Boulder. She co-authored and co-directed the award-winning feature film, *Leading Ladies*, in 2010. About the Choreographer

I am an experimental dance artist originally from Alaska and currently based between Colorado and Berlin. As a queer white person, I orient my work to cultivate radical aliveness as an artist-activist practice. Collaboration, questioning and deep physicality are central to all of my work. Makisig Akin and I co-direct the project-based dance company The Love Makers Company. Our work has recently been produced internationally by DOCK 11, Tanzfabrik Berlin Bühne, Tanztage Berlin, Movement Research at the Judson, Velocity Dance, OUTsider Fest and What You See Festival.

Important collaborators include Makisig Akin, Sara Shelton Mann, Karen Schaffman, Eric Geiger, Ishmael Houston-Jones, Rebecca Salzer and Nhu Nguyen, among others. I have taught/facilitated internationally at festivals and institutions including at Guatemala Contact Improvisation Festival, Tanzfabrik, ImPulsTanz, Tanzquartier, wcciJAM, Ukraine Contact Improvisation Festival, The Field Center, BeingTouch, and SFD+I among others. I currently serve as assistant professor of dance at University of Colorado Boulder. I hold an MFA from University of California San Diego and am trained in the Feldenkrais Method®.

Tiffany “Jimini” Bong is an assistant professor of practice
and founding director of Kaufman Connections and The
Cypher Summit at the USC Gloria Kaufman School of
Dance. She is an international, award-winning hip hop/street

dance artist, educator, entrepreneur and leader that draws on her 20-year experience in dance education and street dance culture to bring next-level pedagogy and programs into diverse spaces that center on communal practice and wellness.

Bong is the founding executive director and artistic director of UniverSOUL Hip Hop, a multicultural group of authentic and socially engaged dance artists with a mission to cultivate community, intergenerational wellness, and wonder through transformative, SOUL-centered dance performance, education, and programming. Their education programs reach more than 100 schools each year and their newest theatrical work—titled *H.O.P.E.*, is a movement love letter to restore hope and joy in the human family, and the show has reached over 15,000 audience members in the first year.

A socio-spiritual activist at heart, Bong continues to build partnerships, productions, and practices that support the authentic preservation and progression of hip hop/street dance culture, particularly as a powerful agent for freedom and transformation.
