The Young Mother

David Conte Poem by Paul Valéry trans. Louise Varèse

Excerpts from The Snow Queen: A Ballet

Holly McMahon

The Snow Queen: A Ballet was written as a second collaboration between choreographer Ixchel Levendowsky and Composer Holly McMahon. A staged version of the full ballet will be performed by dancers in Fort Collins this December. The new work is an adaptation of *The Snow Queen* by Hans Christian Anderson, which is a short story set in 19th century Europe, near Finland. It follows protagonist Gerda's quest to rescue her friend, Kai, from The Snow Queen's castle, after he has been cursed by an evil mirror.

On her journey, Gerda encounters many strange and whimsical characters before finally being led to The Snow Queen's Castle by a reindeer, with the help of a few helpful women who live nearby. The various encounters experienced by Gerda inspired many movements of the ballet, including a set of "variations" or short dances based on the flowers she talks to in an old woman's garden. Below is an excerpt from a translation of the original story, in which the Buttercups describe a beautiful, somewhat abstract scene to Gerda:

"In a small court the bright sun was shining in the first days of spring. The beams glided down the white walls of a neighbor's house, and close by the fresh yellow flowers were growing, shining like gold in the warm sun-rays. An old grandmother was sitting in the air; her grand-daughter, the poor and lovely servant just come for a short visit. She knows her grandmother. There was gold, pure virgin gold in that blessed kiss. There, that is my little story,' said the [Buttercups]."

Addison Hill

Addison Hill is an artist, composer, multi-instrumentalist and educator from Phoenix, Arizona. Her work collages together different mediums, stories and sonic possibilities to create experiences that strive for emotional liberation and connection. When composing, Hill steps into the role of a director to holistically consider the relationship between sound and space, allowing for a more visceral experience inspired by the imaginary worlds Hill lives in.

She received a Bachelor of Music in music composition from Arizona State University and is currently pursuing a master's in music composition with music technology from the University of Colorado Boulder, where she teaches Intro to Music Technology.

Hill's works have been performed at the Gammage Auditorium, PRISMS festival, Wildflower Composer's Festival, Arizona Women's Collaboration Concert, soundSCAPE, Sō Summer

Institute, Superbloom Drone Festival and National Sawdust. Addison spends her free time yapping, napping, yearning and learning, while providing love and support to her needy cat (which is definitely a full time job).

Alan Mackwell

Described as "an original composer with new ideas and a command of complex symphonic writing" (BroadStreet Journal), New Zealander-American Alan Mackwell (b. 1998) is a two-time BMI award-winning young composer and performer based in Boulder, Colorado. In his work, Mackwell seeks to explore a unique blend of atmospheres inspired by his experiences in the Permian Basin, northern New Mexico and Appalachian North Carolina using a highly resonant and bluegrass-influenced musical language as well as the utilization of original field recordings. He earned a BM at the Boston Conservatory, where he studied with John Murphree, Eun Young Lee, Curtis Hughes and Marti Epstein, and earned an MA at Tufts University where he studied with John McDonald and Kareem Roustom. Mackwell is currently pursuing a DMA at the University of Colorado Boulder where he teaches an Intro to Music Technology course.

Mackwells music has been played on three different continents, and several US states. His compositions have been played by high-achieving groups such as Ensemble Modern, The New Zealand Symphony Orchestra, the Amorsima Trio, Hub New Music and the Corvus Ensemble. He was the grand prize winner of the Philadelphia Youth Orchestra's Inaugural Young Composers' Competition in addition to being a two-time finalist for the Todd Corporation Young Composers' Awards hosted by the New

Zealand Symphony Orchestra. Mackwell is the winner of the 2023 American Prize as well as two BMI Student Composer Awards, which he won in 2022 for his string trio Remains of a Permian Gas Station and again in 2025 for Rail Dynamics, a work for string trio and fixed media written for his residency at the TANK Center for the Sonic Arts in September 2024.

Holly McMahon

As a compelling performer and composer with a delicate yet expansive style, Holly McMahon studies and works as a multifaceted musician based in Boulder, Colorado. Throughout her life, she has worked with countless artists across several mediums, including film, theater, dance and performance art. She continues to explore the use of new instrumentations and genres through her studies of music composition, music technology, and piano performance at the University of Colorado Boulder. She is most well known for her works for solo piano, which typically feature carefully sculpted, running lines and evocative yet comfortable rhythmic textures that have been described as "lush" and "uniquely vibrant". McMahon is also known for absurdist works, which provide unconventional representations of ordinary occurrences. As she creates atmosphere and dimension in her writing, McMahon's music is uniquely vibrant and breathtaking, reminding listeners how beautiful, vulnerable and humorous it is to be a human experiencing art.

Aric Vyhmeister

Composer and pianist Aric Vyhmeister (ASCAP) earned a Master of Music student in collaborative piano at the University of Colorado Boulder, and is currently pursuing graduate studies in composition at CU Boulder under Carter Pann. Vyhmeister is

a frequent recitalist and chamber musician in the Denver area, served as music director with the Boulder Opera Company, performed with Art Song Colorado and the SoHap Ensemble, and served on the faculty at Metropolitan State University. He is also a regular guest artist at the Salt Creek Song Festival in Ashland, Nebraska.
